□ The Core Shift: Truth Becomes Contested and Personalised

- The World Economic Forum identifies mis- and disinformation as **one of the top short-term global risks**, capable of destabilising democracies and eroding social cohesion.
- UNDP notes that diminishing trust in institutions and the rise of deepfakes make it “increasingly hard to establish what is real and what is false.”

This means truth becomes less of a shared baseline and more of a **subjective, algorithmically curated experience**.

🧠 Deepfakes and Synthetic Media: Reality Becomes Editable

By the mid-2020s, deepfakes have become nearly indistinguishable from real footage.

- WEF reports that AI-generated narratives now offer “plausible deniability,” allowing opportunists to deflect from real events.
- UNDP warns that even advanced detection tools may not keep up, advising a mindset of “assume nothing, believe no one, doubt everything.”

Future implication:

Authenticity becomes a premium commodity. Verified content, cryptographic signatures, and provenance tracking will become essential cultural infrastructure.

❑ Cognitive Manipulation: Misinformation Becomes a Strategy

Misinformation is no longer just accidental — it is increasingly **strategic**.

- Cognitive science research shows misinformation is used deliberately to undermine shared truth and manipulate public perception.
- WEF highlights psychological profiling and emotional triggers as tools used to fuel polarisation and influence policy.

Future implication:

Societies will face not just false information, but **weaponised narratives** engineered to exploit cognitive biases.

🏛️❑ Collapse of Institutional Trust

Trust in traditional authorities — governments, media, academia — continues to decline.

- UNDP reports that over **60% of people across 28 countries** believe establishment leaders intentionally mislead the public.
- Even scientific institutions face credibility crises due to fraudulent papers and journal retractions.

Future implication:

Truth will increasingly be validated through **peer networks**, decentralised verification systems, and community-driven fact-checking rather than institutional authority.
